A mid-week word from Pastor Darren...

Dear Church Family,

In last night's Wednesday Night Bible Study, we concluded our reading of Paul Chilcote's *Recapturing the Wesley's Vision* with a discussion on what it might mean to serve others with the love of God in the here and now. Specifically, what does it take for God's love to "become flesh and dwell among us" not only in the person of Jesus, but in our lives, our actions, and our collective witness?

This well-loved lyric from Charles Wesley presents the challenge in another way: to serve the present age, my calling to fulfill; O may it all my powers engage to do my Master's will!

Having finished that introduction of Wesleyan faith, we have decided for our next study to pursue a deeper understanding of what we suspect to be a universal theme for any age: the "pursuit of happiness."

To test this theory, I posted the following questions on my personal Facebook account this morning and have already received a number of thoughtful responses over the last few hours. For the sake of further research, I'll ask the same of you.

1. What is your version of "the good life"?

2. Would you say that you are actively or intentionally engaged in the "pursuit of

happiness"?

3. Why or why not?

4. If yes, then how?

In his preaching, John Wesley claimed that "doing all which religion requires will not lessen, but immensely increase, our happiness." I wonder how many of us would honestly agree with that, much less those outside of the church?

And yet, our different versions of "the good life" do not diminish our pursuits. Everyone is searching for something, no matter who they are or what their priorities may be.

As we look at the upcoming holiday on our calendars, I am reminded that in his famous "Letter From a Birmingham Jail," Dr. Martin Luther King proclaimed that

"Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly."

If we believe that to be true (and I must admit that I do), then it would seem that your pursuit of happiness and mine, as well as the pursuits and aspirations of the stranger on the street, are related to one another.

Thus, an honest question for ourselves might be whether we see this interdependency of inevitable community as a blessing or a curse. What if your pursuit of happiness becomes a threat to mine? The age old "neighbor" question between Jesus and the well-schooled lawyer suddenly comes to mind (Lk. 10:25-29).

Beginning next Wednesday, we are going to begin a deeper dive into this exploration of our understanding of "the good life" and the relationship between the Bible and the "pursuit of happiness." We will be starting in Genesis and moving on from there.

Admittedly, there is no shortage of conversation partners in this discussion, from Aristotle to the early church fathers and mothers, to more recent publications on 'positive psychology' and a variety of college curriculums. I am excited about this initiative and expect that we will be engaging in this topic for months to come.

Personally, I also expect to learn a great deal along the way.

What do you think of this discussion? Of these questions? I would love to have you join us for these Wednesday night sessions, or to hear from you at some other time through the week.

This Sunday we will be focusing on John 2:1-11 in our worship services. What happens when the wine runs out? What about the "good life" then? *Come and see!*


